When I was a senior in high school I boarded a bus with several of my classmates bound for Washington for the Right to Life March. As most 17 year olds would do, we waited for the opportune moment to be conveniently separated from the group and turn the day into visiting the Smithsonian and other warm buildings. It was very obvious that we had no concept of the meaning of why the hundreds of thousands of people were gathered.

Thirty four years later I boarded a bus with several of my brothers from Council 6100 bound for Washington for the Right to Life March. This time I had no intention of being separated from the group and taking in the sights. As we stood in the pouring rain and mud listening to the speakers at the rally, I looked around and was amazed by the number of young people there. The groups of these younger adults seemed to be "color coded" by distinct articles of clothing such as hats or t-shirts which portrayed unity. I overheard one young woman say to her friend that they should blow this off and take in some sights. I was waiting to see the two of them disappear, when the other young woman turned to her friend and said she was here for a reason and that if she thought this was a pleasure trip then you're on your own.

Our group was in the middle of the march. When we reached the top of the hill on Constitution Avenue we looked back and all we could see was a sea of people behind us. It was a massive statement of our worthy cause of protecting the unborn. Yet when I got home that evening I tried to find some information on the main stream media websites and pretty much found little to no coverage of this massive rally for life. Though this coverage was

negligible at best, the message is resonating; most polls now show the trend of the people in this country is that more and more people across the country are pro-life. Unfortunately our governing bodies are not paying attention.

I want to thank Brother Gerry Kaufhold for being Council 6100's champion of life. Each year he coordinates the bus trip, Baby Bottle Boomerang and other Pro-Life initiatives. I also ask that you continue to pray that the moral compass of our country points in a direction that protects life.

Chaplain's Corner

My Dear Brother Knights,

Finding Joy in Ordinary Time

A lyricist once wrote that December is "the most wonderful time of the year." Well, maybe. But it is this lyric that occurs to me when I think about the month of February, *my* most wonderful time of the year. The Presidents' Birthday weekend has become the occasion of a family reunion. Black History Month provides opportunities to honor and recommit to achieving diversity.

Alas, I have not been asked to reflect on my favorite things here. Rather, I have been asked to reflect on the power and grace of liturgy and scripture and how they connect to daily life. Yet isn't that precisely our frequent challenge: to allow the liturgy and the word to penetrate our hearts and form our lives not only when we gather as church, but in the favorite and ordinary events that give substance to our days?

The Gospels for these Sundays of Ordinary Time are Mark's early accounts of healing miracles. Simon's mother-in-law is sick, and the disciples implore Jesus to make her well. A leper approaches Jesus and says, "If you wish, you can make me clean." Upon Jesus' return to Capernaum, so many people gather in his home that friends have to lower a paralytic through an opening in the roof so that Jesus can heal him. In each case, Jesus heals the unfortunate, and miracles come to life in front of the crowds.

Simon's mother-in-law gets up and waits on the disciples, visible proof of Jesus' power to heal. The leper is made clean and gleefully abandons Jesus' directive to keep it to himself as he publicizes the miracle far and wide. The paralytic picks up his mat and walks home, leaving the gathered crowd astounded. To be sure, these Gospels are about the healing power of Jesus. But in this moment, I am aware of something else: the crowds that followed Jesus wherever he went.

Mark writes that because of the crowds it was impossible for Jesus to openly enter a town or village. He would remain on the outskirts rather than come to the center of a community. Yet people kept seeking him no matter where he was. It was a big enough issue, according to Mark's Gospel, that in order to get away, Jesus got up early to find a deserted place to pray. Even then, the disciples had to run him down to tell him people were looking for him. And so

many people gathered in his home when he was there that the door was blocked and people could not get in.

What was it that made Jesus so irresistible? We cannot absolutely answer that question, but it is good to think about what Jesus was like, and why people were so intent on being with him. He was a miracle worker, that is true, and people did come seeking miracles. But he was not the only wonder worker of his time. So it seems to me that there must have been something else. I suspect there was a goodness and a sense of joy about Jesus that engaged minds and hearts and compelled the crowds to follow him.

I invite you to imagine sitting among those crowds. Observe Jesus' interaction with them and the disciples. Watch him listen to the disciples and talk to Simon's mother-in-law. Hold your breath as he heals the leper. Note his small smile as the paralytic walks toward home. Feel the joy.

All of us long for his joy that sustains us in difficult times, in moments of triumph and even in the midst of the mundane. For with that joy we are more apt to see the presence of God and the miracles that surround us in the ordinary and extraordinary events of life: in the busyness of a day when we listen to the Presence within; in the midst of conflict when we see the other's need; in the distraction of worry about job, children or money when we trust we are never truly alone.

And more, in the accomplishments of those who overcame the divisions of race; in the miracle of birth that birthdays celebrate. Embracing his joy, we might say, makes each day the most wonderful time of the year.

March for Life Bus Trip to Washington, DC

On Monday January 23, 2012, the Knights of Columbus Fr. Joseph A. Cassidy Council 6100 joined thousands of abortion opponents who marched to the Supreme Court on Monday to mark the 39th anniversary of the Roe v. Wade decision legalizing abortion, and supportive lawmakers urged them to further their cause by working to defeat President Barack Obama in the fall.

The "March for Life" has been held every year since 1974, a year after the landmark Supreme Court ruling. It's consistently one of the largest protests of the year in Washington, although soggy, chilly conditions likely kept this year's numbers down a bit.

House Speaker John Boehner addressed the group, reminding those gathered on the muddy National Mall that he's one of 12 children. "I'm sure it wasn't easy for our mother to have 12 of us, but I'm glad we're all here," the Republican lawmaker said. "I've never considered being pro-life a label or a political position. It's just who I am."

Several dozen members of Congress addressed the rally and were cheered by participants, many of whom carried signs reading "I Vote Pro-Life First," "Defund

Planned Parenthood” and “Face It ... Abortion Kills a Person.” Signs endorsing Republican presidential contenders were less ubiquitous, although some in the crowd favored Rick Santorum and Ron Paul, both favorites of conservative Christians.

Rep. Chris Smith, R-N.J., urged anti-abortion voters to unite behind the eventual GOP nominee. “We don’t have the luxury of disunity or nominee disappointment or apathy,” Smith said. “For the sake of the innocent, failure to unite is not an option.”

Republican frontrunner Mitt Romney has said he wants to see *Roe v. Wade* overturned. But Janet Hoven, 55, of Chester, N.J., said he still needed to do more to court anti-abortion activists. “He’s going to have to come out very strong for life. I certainly will pray that he will,” said Hoven, a Romney supporter.

Carolee Zentkovich, 68, of Columbia Station, Ohio, said she supports Santorum but would gladly vote for Romney in the hopes of getting Obama out of office. Americans remain strongly divided on abortion.

A Gallup poll last year showed that 49 percent of respondents identified themselves as “pro-choice,” while 45 percent called themselves “pro-life.” The same survey found that 50 percent of Americans believe abortion should be legal under some circumstances, 27 percent said it should be legal in all cases and 22 percent said it should always be illegal.

Nancy Keenan, president of NARAL Pro-Choice America, said in a statement that politicians supporting the March for Life were ignoring more pressing issues. “Anti-choice politicians and their allies promised to focus on creating jobs, yet they are attacking a woman’s right to choose at near-record levels,” Keenan said. “This extreme agenda is out of touch with our country’s values and priorities.”

Some marchers said opposition to abortion transcends partisan politics. “Eight years ago, when George W. Bush was president, we were still out here,” said Michael Tober, 36, of Muskegon, Mich. “It’s not a Republican thing; it’s not a Democrat thing. It’s a human thing.”

Council 6100 Scholarship Information

It's not too early to be looking at scholarships for 2012. Information and applications for all scholarships listed below can be obtained on line at our Council 6100 web site <http://www.kofc6100.org> and click on "Scholarship Info" in the home page table. The following summary includes 4 scholarships for HS Seniors entering college in the fall and one, a 4 year scholarship from the Paterson Federation, for students entering a Catholic HS.

Council 6100 Scholarships

Recipient: Students graduating high school

Award: 4 scholarships - \$1500, \$1000, \$500 (2)

Qualifications: All applicants must be a resident of Mount Olive Township or a child of any Council 6100 member and are appraised on 5 categories: Scholastic Achievement, Church/Religious Institution activities, Community activities, Extra Curricular activities and Essay. The essay will describe the applicant's reasons for continuing their education and why a scholarship is important to them.

Sponsor: Knights of Columbus Council 6100

Deadline: April 15th (date specified by the applicants high school may be earlier)

Thomas Christopher DeLalla Memorial Scholarship

Recipient: Student graduating high school

Award: \$1000

Qualifications: All applicants must be a resident of Mount Olive Township or a child of any Council 6100 member and are appraised on dedicated commitment and leadership in organizations or activities to benefit others, the community and the youth of Mount Olive Township. Special consideration will be given for participation and leadership in activities or programs which directly benefit local community youth organizations (e.g. religious organizations, squires, youth group, sports, scouting, other community youth based organizations.). An essay is required describing why a scholarship is important to the applicant and what the applicant did specifically that qualifies him/her as the best candidate to receive this scholarship.

Sponsor: Knights of Columbus Council 6100

Deadline: April 15th (date specified by the applicants high school may be earlier)

Ernie DiCicco Sr. Scholarship

Recipient: Student graduating high school.

Award: \$1000/yr up to 4 years.

Qualifications: The applicant must be active in church, community and school activities. The first preference is to a parishioner of St. Jude's parish in Budd Lake. A 500 word essay must be written to explain why the student should be considered worthy of this award. The above criteria are main consideration, but this does not rule out other candidates who can show similar involvement. This scholarship can be renewed annually for up to 3 additional years providing the student maintains a B average and remains a full time student

The applicants must be sponsored by a member of the New Jersey Knights of Columbus in good standing, a resident of New Jersey, and entering their freshman year of college. The applicant need not attend a Catholic high school or plan to attend a Catholic college or university.

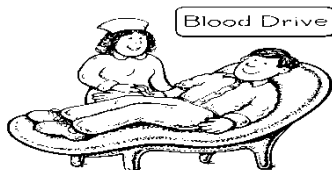

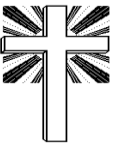

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
